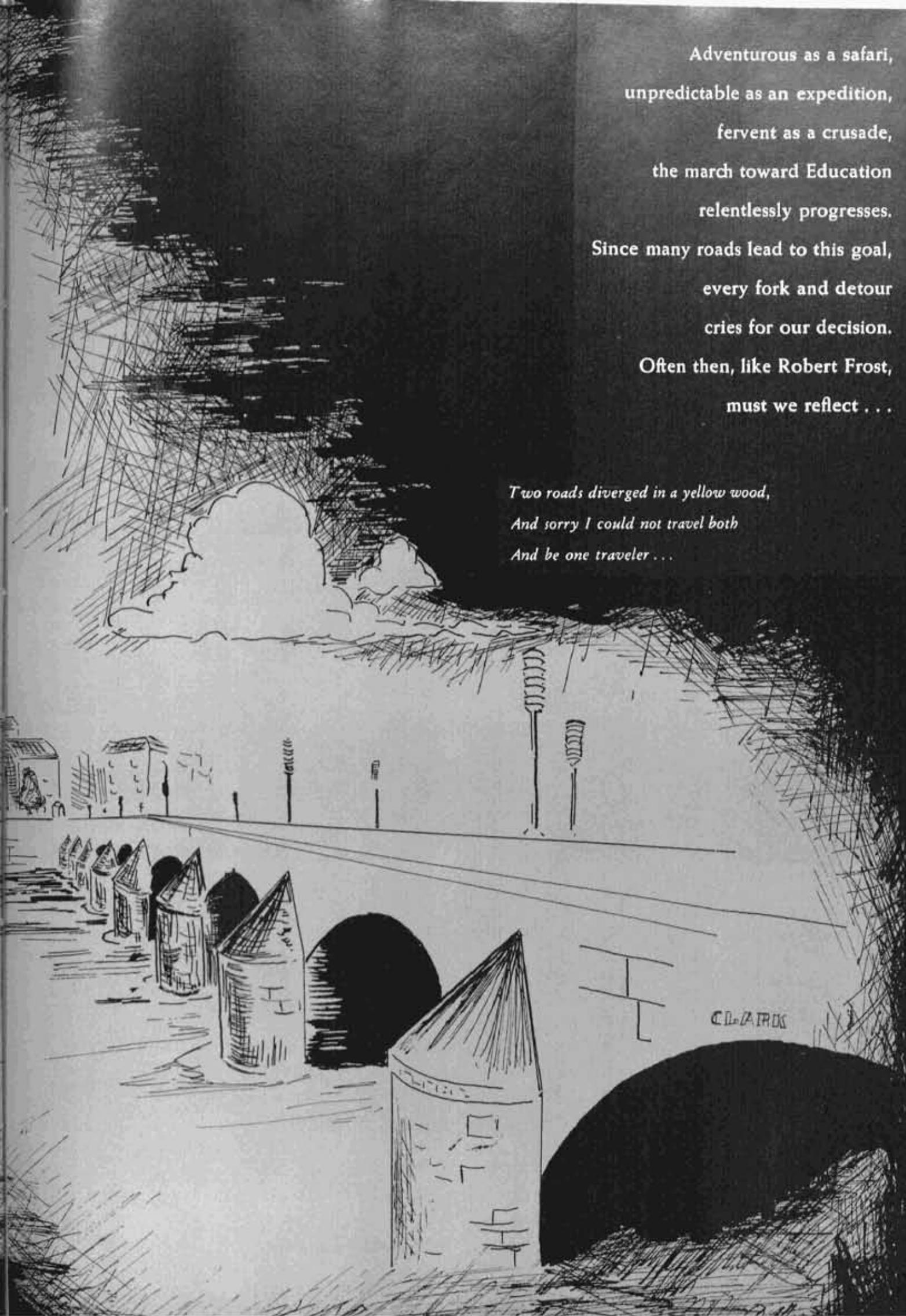




ORLEANS

During the third exciting mile, we worked diligently on the Junior-Senior Prom and other dances, cake sales and slave sales; these were respites which bolstered us for the continued journey.

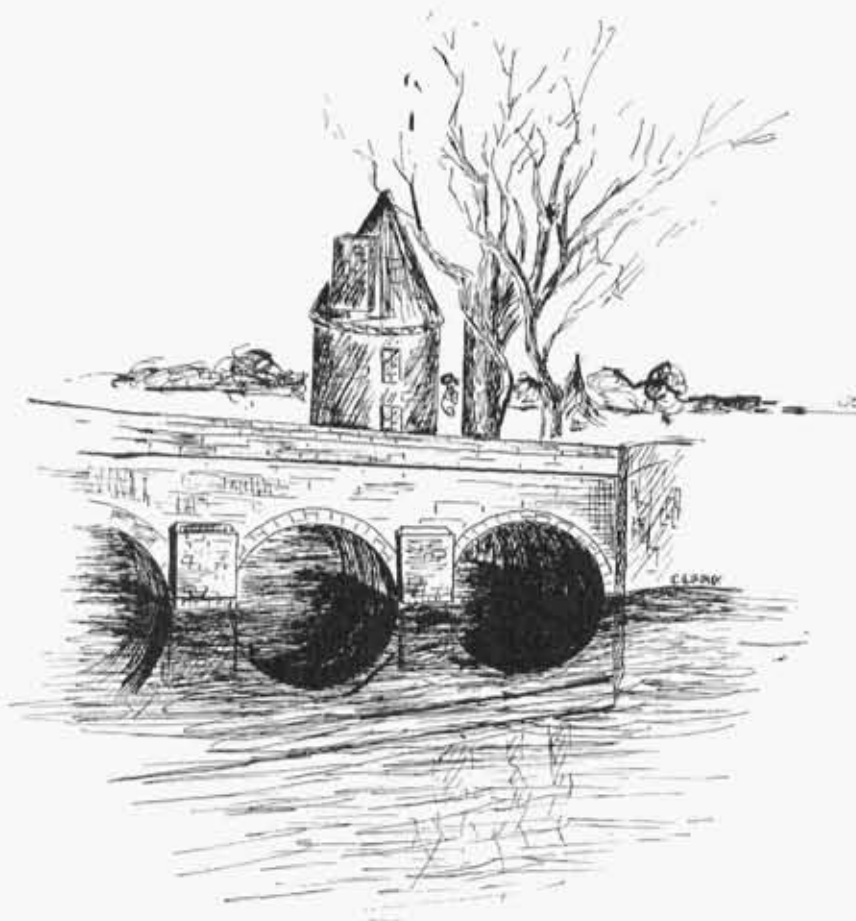
