Graduation Ceremonies To Be Held At La Chapelle Chapel On June 10

"Pomp and Circumstance" will lead the march of 54 Orleans American High School Seniors down the aisle of La Chapelle Chapel the evening of June 10.

The American Academic Adviser to the European Institute in Paris,

Dr. O.W. Perlmutter, will be the main guest speaker. Dr. Perlmutter is the liaison between American students and European Universities and will speak on the topic, "Huck Finn, Boy of Orleans", emphasizing youth and its opportunities in the modern

world. Other speakers at the graduation program will be the valedictorian and salutarian of the Class of 1962, Mr. James Lamb and Miss Joan Schmidt, respectively.

After the presentation of the graduating class, Mr. Korlund, principal of the Orleans School System, will turn the program over to Mr. Barlow, Superintendent of schools, who will present the Seniors with their diplomas. Mrs. Joseph B. Franklin, retiring president of the Officers' Wives Club, will present, to three worthy graduating students, scholarships for future studies. Mrs. Franklin will be representing all the Women's Clubs of Orleans when making these awards. Mr. Hearn, English professor and Senior Class Advisor, will present a Senior Class Scholarship. Mr. Rembis, head of the Guidance Department, will make awards honoring outstanding work in areas of academic endeavor.

Music for the evening's program will be provided by the A Capella Choir of the high school, under the direction of Miss A. Harris. The Choir will sing "The Cherubic Hymn" by A. Grcchaninoff and a piece by G.F. Handel, "Hallelujah, Amen".

Marshalls for the entrance and retirement of the graduation class are Pat Bennett and Lori Smith. Junior boys will be ushers.

At the conclusion of the graduation exercises, the traditional reception conducted by the Sophomore Class will be held at the Officer's Club Annex at the hospital. All Seniors and families and friends are invited to this event.

When asked how she felt about the

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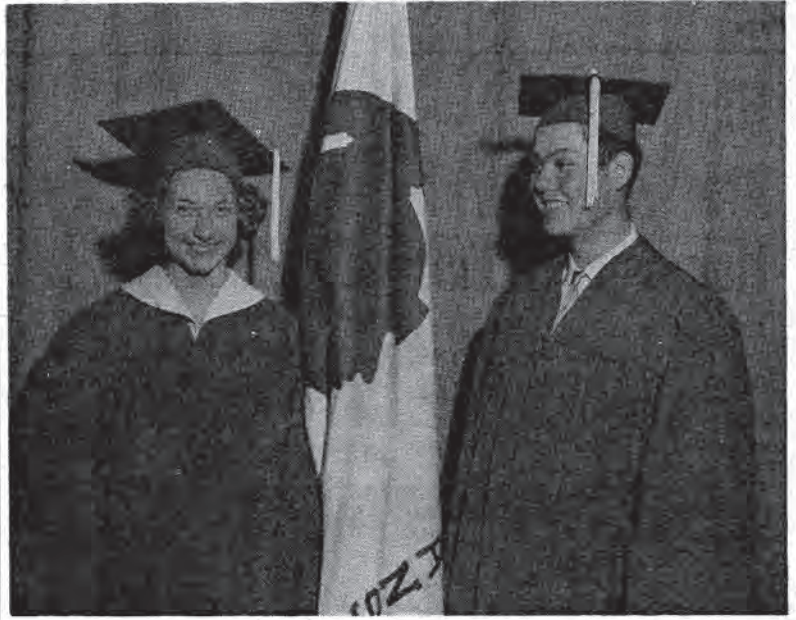
Principal Lauds Class Of 1962 For Leadership

Jones Named Top Athlete Of Year

On the basis of his outstanding sports record for the school year of 1961-62, Steve Jones, son of Sgt Maj and Mrs. Thomas Jones, was elected Athlete of the Year. Steve was presented this award at the Annual Sports Banquet, the evening of May, 22. Mr. Friedman, head coach for Orleans, in awarding a medal and plaque to Steve recalled this fine athlete's sports log for this year.

In Football, playing the position of quarterback, Steve made all-France and was a member of the COMZ Championship team. This team holds a record of six wins and no losses for this year. As backbone of the team, Steve scored 74 points in six games, and ran the ball 767 yards in six games, an average of 127 yards.

In Basketball, Steve held down the position of guard on the USAREUR Class B Championship teams. He was elected the Most Valuable Player in a tournament held in Germany. Statistically speaking, he scored 66 points in three games in the German Tournament, and an average of 140 points per game during the season.

In Track, Steve throws the discus and the shot put, as well as performs in the broad jump and, occasionally, running in the 100 meter and 200 meter. Here, too, he also participated in a German Tournament.

Steve was born in Honolulu, Hawaii.

With the same boys returning to the court next year, coach Farmer and the J.V. coach, Mr. Huberty, can count on a lots of help in another attempt to grab the USAREUR championship for a second year in a row. As a tip to all the OHS sports fans: look out for the Paris-Orleans meet next year. All of Paris' players are returning to their berths, and this will make for a battle royal when the two meet.

A stronger team is seen in soccer by coach Farmer, as he summed up the prospects for the up coming year, "With the student body for support and with the fine athletes available, Orleans has had a winning year, but you haven't seen anything yet!"

OHS Athletes Boast Top Record In COMZ

This year has been one of the most gratifying and rewarding year in the sports history of our high school. This year, out of the six sports teams who represented OHS in interscholastic competition, OHS athletes brought home two COMZ championships and one USAREUR championship. Let us look at each of these teams individually.

For the first time, the year saw Orleans win the COMZ football championship. OHS went through a six-game schedule without a single loss. This perfect season was largely due to the outstanding playing of such fine athletes as Jimmy Helm, Bud Flette, Ham Miley and Steve Jones. All four of these boys made the All-Star team for football. The highlights of the season came at the expense of Chad high school as we trounced them 39-0 in the final game of the season at Patton Field behind the strong running of Helm and Jones and the hard blocking of Miley and Flette. The victory revenged our loss last year at the hands of Chad 45-0 and Coach Friedman thought this was the finest way he could think of to end a great season.

Next year, the chances of Orleans to repeat as COMZ champs look good, because a large number of players who started this year will be back. There is Tim Baranouskas, a 200-lb tackle; Dick Derrickson, a 200-lb center; Butch Roller, 170-lb guard; Joe Hardin, 160-lb end; Jim Helm, 160-lb All-COMZ halfback; and Steve Jones, a 170-lb quarterback, who also made ALL-COMZ. To fill the gaps left by Miley and Flette, we have Leonard Gedgoudas and Doug Von Schritlz. Next year should be a good one for the Trojans who will defend their first COMZ championship.

In basketball, no one in USAREUR could keep up with our "iron five" Don Ballard, Joe Hardin, Steve Lowe, Steve Jones and Pete Steineback. These five athletes, along with strong support from Jim Helm and Dave Wightman out-shot, out-rebounded and out-fought Orleans opponents on the hardwood court.

During the regular season, Orleans suffered only one loss, that coming at the hands of Paris High School in a triple overtime, 60-54. Nevertheless, the Trojans stomped the Pirates the next day by 14 points to put our record at 9-1 for conference play. This record established Orleans as the number one team in France and entitled us to a berth in the USAREUR Class B Basketball championships held at Bitburg, Germany during March.

Here the Trojans had to face the top high schools in Germany. Orleans won the first game from Bitburg handily with three men hitting for more than ten points. This advanced us into the second round where we played the powerful Baumholder five. After two closely contested quarters, the Trojans broke the game open and won going away by 14 points. The victory put Orleans in the finals against the number one team in Germany, Wuertzburg.

At the outset of the championship game, the score was close, but Orleans gradually pulled away until the last quarter, when Wuertzburg put on a startling rally, closing to within two points when the final buzzer rang. The Trojans greatly surprised the officials in Germany. This was very evident since Steve Jones and Don Ballard were selected to the All-Star team and Jones was voted the outstanding player of the tournament. The Trojan's outlook for the 62-63 season is very good since they will have four starters back and Helm to fill team captain Steve Lowe's shoes.

1962 was the first time in three years that Orleans has lost the track crown. Although we lost, it was not because we didn't try, but rather

that we faced a much stronger squad from Verdun, who won the coveted track championship. Nevertheless, Orleans did send four representatives to Germany. Steve Kehoe took second place in the 100 meter dash and fourth in the 180-yard low hurdles for six points and Steve Jones took two fourth places. . . one in the broad jump and the other in the shot put for four points. The combined total of these two boys gave Orleans a fourth place in the final USAREUR standings.

The OHS soccer team, led by Buddy Dodrill and the Coleman brothers, played hard and clean soccer the whole year, but couldn't match their opponent's experience on the field and finished the season with a 1-4 record. The team was composed mostly of sophomores and freshmen, which indicates the chances of a successful season next year because these boys have gained a year's experience.

The Trojan tennis team, despite five cancelled matches, managed to compile a 1-2 record during the season. The netters' single victory came at the expense of Verdun, who bowed to the Trojans 3-2 in a closely contested match. The Trojans' two defeats came at the hands of Paris and Dreux. Paris won their match 4-1 and Dreux beat the Trojans 3-2. The tennis team sent four representatives to Germany to compete in the USAREUR tennis championships. These four were Joe Hardin Stu Prather, Stan Behner, and Dan Podlesnik. They competed in Heidleburg May 23-26.

The Orleans Golf Team compiled a 2-4 record during the season. Their victories came at the expense of Dreux and Poitiers. The team is composed of mostly freshmen and sophomores who are improving all the time. The team, despite their mediocre record, sent three representatives to Germany. The USAREUR championships were held in Nuremburg, May 25-30. Representing OHS were Alan Rasper, Mike O'Neal and Corky Lamb.

This was the first year the Orleans has had a wrestling team, nevertheless, they made a very good showing behind such standouts as Tom Jones, Tim Baranouskas, Bruce Anderson and Leonard Gedgoudas who represented us in Germany.

In conclusion we can say that this year has been one of the best athletic years in the history of OHS. The over-all win-loss for 1962 was 32 wins and 13 losses. No other school in COMZ can match this record. Let us hope that our teams will fare as well next year as they have this past year.

Soccer Squad Rated Better

The soccer team closed its season with a 0-1 loss to Verdun on May 11. The team finished its second season of competition with one win and four losses.

Coach Marv Farmer anticipates coaching again next year and expects a better season. Mr. Farmer noted that "in the last few games the team began to play what looked like soccer."

Seniors Russ Cook and Philip Thomsen will be lost to graduation and transfers will claim starters Bob Uhler, Buddy Dodrill and Doug Monohon off the team for next year. If all goes as expected, Coach Farmer should have returning lettermen John and Volker Coleman, Chuck Wise, John Steel, Steve Allen, Dale Bray and Joe Todd on next year's squad.
